A REAL RESURRECTION

Apr. 2nd - 2 Recon. Cars and 2 Jeeps
arrive in camp - great
jubilation. Evacuation
of patients begun immediately - 35 evacuated.
Bread - 7 to loaf - 4
French packages policed
up and party had by 6
clean up detail.

Apr. 3rd - Potato Soup - "C" Ration -
(meat-noodles) Ramsey
cooked mashed potatoes,

Pot Pie and Rice Pudding with
chocolate, G.I.'s have plenty of
cigarettes and candy. - snipers
nearby taken care of.

Apr. 4th - No more Jerry soup -
"C" Rations, Candy -
Red Cross Clubmobile
with coffee and doughnuts -
moved from Bk27
to Hospital - patients
all evacuated.

Apr. 5th - V Mail to Ree, Mom &
Dad & Dan Scarritt -
"C" Rations, candy -
Apr. 6th - "C" Rations - bread -
cigarettes - candy -
evacuating 50 per hour
(25 American - 25 British)
- flying them to
Eng. & France.

Apr. 7th - "C" Rations Red Cross
Doughnuts - evacuated
thru hospital (cold
nasal pharyngitis)

by 3/4 ton weapons carrier 40 miles from STALAG 1XB to 58th Field Hospital at Nidda, Germany. Registered, deloused. Given toilet articles, ate GI chow - Spam white bread peanut butter, orange marmalade-coffee-boiled potatoes-attended Movie. "Martha Driscoll & Noah Berry Jr. in "Hi Beautiful" - retired at 9:30 PM slept in cot with GI blankets - took pants off for first time in 113 days.

Apr. 8th - First GI breakfast - powdered eggs-bread-coffee-oatmeal-powdered milk-processed and classified "ZI".

Apr. 9th - Breakfast-eggs, oatmeal-coffee-heard reville for first time since Dec. 1, 1944-flew in C47 to Marlboro, England near Swindon, time

2 hrs. & 45 min.-bus to 130th Station Hospital - slept in bed with mattress and sheets (unbelievable).

Apr. 10th - Taken to 186th General Hospital near Cirencester. Diagnosis- Malnutrition.

Apr. 11th - Transferred from Ward 5 to 14. Xrayed chest- letters to Ree, Mom & Dad - Charlie Durr- Special Diet for all PW's.

Apr. 12th - Dietician asks us for a list of foods we would like - first PW and apparently experimental cases ice cream and chow 5 times a day - rec'd shoes, 2 prs. socks and 4 handkerchiefs. Urine Analysis & blood count
